- As an affiliated college, examination evaluation reforms are adopted as directed by the University. This includes coding and masking of answer books, supply of photo copy of the assessed answer books, revaluation etc..
- At the college level, providing question bank, giving assignments, solving previous year's question papers, conducting of preliminary examination etc. have been followed for the benefit of the students.
- Examinations rules are read out every day prior to the commencement of the examination so as to keep the examinees away from malpractices.
- On the concluding day of the examination, a thank-giving notice is circulated by the head of the institution in all examination blocks addressed to the examinees for extending their full co-operation in the process of conducting the examination.

### Best practices (B)

**Title of the practice:** Fee collection through the bank

**Goal:** To economise the time and to enhance the quality of the system of fee collection and to maintain the security of funds.

**Context:** As this institution is 100% unaided, the funds generated are only through the fees collection from the learners. The institution felt that there is an acute need for enhancing the efficiency of fees collection system. This practice is introduced with the following objectives;

- Quick collection of all types of fees.
- Better accounting.
- To economise the time of the learners.
- To avoid the long queue for the payment of fees at the counter.
- To maintain the security of amount collected.
- To enable the students to pay the fees at any branch of the bank near to their residence.
- To avoid the risk of robbery in transit.

**The Practice:** The institution through this new system has made the fees collection easier for both the students and the college. The students were issued challans and asked to pay the fees at the concerned bank in the college account. Every day the bank provides details to the college pertaining to the fees collection under different heads so as to enable the accountant to deal with fee collection effectively.

**Evidence of success:** This process of fees collection by the institution is 100% safe and quick. The learners are benefitted by paying the fees in the nearest branch of the bank. This is a step towards the implementation of government policy of cashless economy.

The system helps the institution in having an accurate accounting system with daily reports of fees collection which directly appears in college computers. This is a simple and reliable system of fee collection falling under the best practice.

#### **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:**

Though this system is appreciated by all, the institution encountered certain problems sometimes like excess payment by the students which does not reflect in the daily report creating problem at the time of annual auditing. Discontinuous and slow internet comes in the

way of quick accounting work. On many occasions the wrong data entry by the banking staff also creates accounting problems.

The college paid large amount of money for the purchase of software at the time of its installation and is shelling out large amount every year for the maintenance of the software under the annual maintenance contract.

In-spite of these problems the college has successfully implemented this best practice from the academic year 2016-17.

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
