



































Best practices (A)

Title of the practice: Institutional academic progress through Feedback, Audit and Surveys.

Goal: To attain perfection in the functioning of the College and the holistic development of the learners.

Context: The institution believes that without taking feedback from the stake holders, deficiencies in various areas of institutional functioning cannot be identified and suitable policy cannot be formulated and implemented. Yearly Academic Audit ,periodical evaluation of the Teachers by the learners, Environmental Green Audit, Infrastructural Inspection give the institution necessary inputs regarding weaknesses and suggestions thereof will help the institution in framing institutional development policy.

The Practice: The institution has conducted an **academic audit** during this academic year to ascertain the academic standard and evolve necessary strategy to overcome the weaknesses. The audit report indicates the need for improvement in certain areas under academics during the 2012-13. The institution implemented certain policy measures to overcome the short falls during the next academic year (2013-14).

The institution conducted an **infra-structural inspection** in December 2012. The inspection report recommended the certain requirements in addition to the existing infra-structure. The Management of the institution accepted the report and planned to overcome the deficiencies prior to the beginning of the next academic year 2013-14.

Students Feedback is taken pertaining to the teacher's performance. Students are expected to evaluate the teachers on various parameters in the process of teaching and learning .The analysis of such evaluation indicated that only 5% of the Teachers require improvement, 10% of the teachers have average performance and 85% of them are good and excellent. This analysis was brought to the notice of the faculty members for taking necessary steps for further improvement.

During this year for the first time an **environmental green audit** was conducted to ascertain the efforts taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly. The audit report helped the institution to initiate necessary steps to keep the college campus clean and environment friendly.

Evidence of success:

1. Out of the total recommendation made under academic audit, following measures are taken:

- a. The faculty members are advised to enrol themselves for Ph.D Degree and undertake research projects.
 - b. Inducement is given to the learners to enrol themselves for PG Courses after graduation.
 - c. Special Coaching was arranged for the students to prepare them for competitive examinations.
 - d. Admission Grievance Cell and Admission Guidance Cell were formed.
2. Under the infra-structural inspection, the following deficiencies were attended based on the report :
- a. Special facilities are provided to differently abled students e.g. a ramp at the entrance.
 - b. To keep the college campus clean, housekeeping contract is given with an effective monitoring system
 - c. Suggestion boxes were installed at the entrance of the college, library, staff room and other prominent places.
 - d. An upgraded security system with CCTV's cameras, bio-metric attendance system is introduced.
3. With regard to green audit following steps are taken :
- a. An Environmental Green Club is introduced to initiate and monitor environmental Issues connected with the college.
 - b. To create awareness among the public , a rally was organised regarding clean environment.
 - c. To minimise the use of plastic bags, a public awareness programme was arranged for residents staying in the vicinity of the college.
4. Based on the students evaluation report , individual faculty members are given the details of grade obtained by them under various heads so as to enable them to overcome the deficiencies in certain areas:

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

PROBLEM:

1. As this exercise is done within the college level, no problems were encountered.
2. However, the outcomes of audit, survey, feedback are based on average figures and therefore 100% accuracy cannot be maintained.

RESOURCES REQUIRED:

- This practice does not involve any kind of major financial implications.
- The management takes care of the resources required for the successful implementation of the practice.

Best practices (B)

Title of the practice: Integrated approach for personal effectiveness.

Goal:

1. To ease-off pressures and tensions of the students.
2. To provide them platform to relax their mind & body through the medium of music, meditation and Yoga.
3. To enhance and nurture the pre-existing skills of the students.
4. To help students to control their way of thinking, feeling and body processes.

Context: Keeping in mind the vision of our institution of tuning in the minds of youth for an ever-changing world, the college has proposed an integrated approach for personal effectiveness.

This approach also leads to achievement of our mission of empowering our students with knowledge and skills. The practice organised under this approach were music and Yoga sessions for the students.

The Practice:

- a) Weekly music classes were arranged for the students by the faculties expert in the field.
- b) Induction of students to the book notes of Hindustani and Carnatic classical music.
- c) Introducing students to the basics of music by giving them knowledge of suras and sargam.
- d) Carrying out the practice of 2 minute meditation prior to every lecture to improve the concentration of the students.
- e) Arranging meditation and Yoga classes by the Yog-Gurus and Experts.
- f) Arranging workshops/seminar for the students and teachers to understand the importance of meditation and Yoga in today's stressful world.

Evidence of success:

- i) After the practice session we found the students to be sharper, creative, enlightened and full of energy and enthusiasm. The joy of finding the key to success and life could have been easily found on the faces of the students.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- Difficulties for the faculties to engage themselves in music and Yoga classes as they had other college duties of higher priority.
- Lack of resource persons and experts who are dedicated to promote Indian classical music on a full-time basis.

NOTES:

- A major step taken by the institution to develop and enhance the skills of the students.
- Initial stages even though problems have arisen, efforts will be taken to overcome them and to achieve success in our mission.

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
